



Thank you to those who attended the “POST Plan” meeting, August 11. Your presence sends a message that there are people in the 66532 zip code area that want to maintain a post office in Robinson. Realizing that the time scheduled for the meeting was not feasible for everyone, those who were able to attend represented those who were not with questions and comments. While the current office holders and political candidates outside the Robinson area were not in attendance, Mayor BeDunnah and city council members Marsha Ganstrom, Sharilyn Gilbert, and David Taylor were there to represent the needs and concerns of the area citizens.

Part of the result of the POST Plan action by postal officials is a required change in the hours that the Robinson Post Office window will be open for service. The lobby hours will remain as they are now so that patrons may continue to pick up mail from their postal boxes and use the inside drop box.

Starting September 20th the Post Office window will be open 7:30 a.m. – 11:30 a.m. Monday-Friday. Saturday time will remain 7:45 a.m. – 8:45 a.m.

Robinson Community Church School Begins

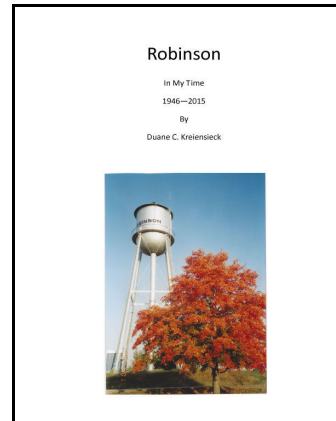

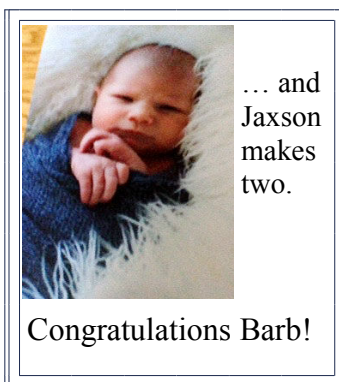
