Huntington's Disease took the life of Jim Bruning in 2007, as well as many members of his family. It is a rare and horrible neurological disease that causes its victims the loss of coordination and the ability to talk clearly, relentless depression, the loss of most all normal abilities, and eventually it is fatal. It has been compared to having several diseases at the same time, including Parkinson's and Alzheimer's diseases. Success in finding solutions for any one of the neurological diseases is expected to benefit research in the others.

Funds from the concert on July 12 will be given to research to help find a cure or treatment for Huntington's Disease. There will be a free will offering, and the public is cordially invited to attend. Come, bring your family and friends, and enjoy the music.
