City Reminds Residents of Ordinances—Robinson City Ordinances 226 & 271 make it unlawful to permit weeds to grow on private properties within Robinson. The same ordinances allow for the city to abate the nuisances when after a request to the occupant (owner or tenant) to take care of the nuisance has not been met within a specified time as outlined in the ordinances. The cost for the city to abate such nuisance has been set as follows: \$100 minimum for the first hour of labor, and \$60 per man the remainder of the time necessary to free the property of the violation(s). The owner will be sent a bill and if the bill is unpaid within 30 days, the fees will be assessed to the property’s taxes
